YOGA & THE PINEAL GLAND STABILITY AND ECSTASY

SADHGURU ISHA FOUNDATION

Sadhguru: As scientists find better instruments to study the human brain, one thing is becoming clear: there is much more to be known about the mind than we right now know.

One aspect of yogic physiology that aligns with modern neurosciences has to do with the pineal gland. This gland was always recognized as being associated with the agna chakra. Today, neuroscientists say that the secretions of the pineal gland control one's moods and experiences.

While medical sciences have made it clear that chemicals can create pleasant and unpleasant experiences within you that are very real for you. Actually, you are causing everything to yourself. The only difference is whether you cause it with or without outside help. If you simply become ecstatic right now, you are creating it without outside help. If you cause the same thing with outside stimulation, it may be the same thing experience-wise, but the end result could damage the system. Unconscious experiences, however big they are, are of no significance for one's growth and transformation.

An aspect of yogic physiology which is totally absent in modern medical sciences is something which I constantly keep "on" within myself, called the bindu. "Bindu" means a tiny point. It is a particular spot on the pineal gland. If you touch the bindu, it will release secretions that make you feel ecstatic. To activate the bindu, there is a certain point at the back of your head. So many cultures around the world have recognized this and understood that this point needs to be protected and activated.


You will see, many times when people are in certain meditative processes, they become overwhelmed because the "glass of ambrosia" inside is tipping. If you give a glass full of water to a child, he will spill it all over the place when he drinks. Similarly, their glass is tipping because they do not know yet how to sip gently. If you do the necessary sadhana, after some time, you could consciously drink from it. Once you can consciously drink from it, every cell in the body is ecstatic.

But the bindu has another point to it which also has a secretion but is poisonous. If you tip the wrong side of the glass, then poison will spread through the system. It will spread through the system in such a way that, for what looks like simply no reason, you are miserable. A lot of people have done that to themselves. They have become miserable by doing improper things with life.

No matter what you are pursuing in life - money, wealth, power, God, or enlightenment - essentially what you are seeking is a sense of sweetness within you. Either you hit it accidentally or consciously - that is the choice you have.

In yoga, the initial phases of sadhana are aimed at stability, not ecstasy. If ecstasy comes before stability, you are heading for a crash. If ecstasy comes after stability, it is fantastic.

The processes of ecstasy were never written down. It is only in the presence of a certain being that those things happen – because they are very subjective. In some books on tantra, they have tried to write it down, which I feel is very irresponsible. Suppose you read a book where the first two chapters talk about some simple practices to stabilize yourself and the last five chapters talk about practices to take you to ecstatic levels



 – which one will you do? People will not go for stability, they will go for ecstasy - and they will break up.

Never aspire for anything that is not yet in your perception. Just do your sadhana. That is why traditions have always been insisting on trust. If you did not know how a plant grows, if I show you a lump of filth and the

beautiful flower and say, "These two things are the same..." would you believe me? It takes a crazy sense of trust. That is why we do not talk about all those things. Because this cannot be logically worked out.

A man walked into the court. He was the defendant. The judge looked at him and asked, "Do you have a lawyer?" The man said, "No, but I have some good friends in the jury."

This is how it is. You cannot logically work this out. That is why the Guru came into the picture, because a little fixing is needed. Without the fixing, you will not jump. You will stand on this side forever. Without a little fixing, you will not cross the line.







Ten years ago, at the age of 21, he was jailed for five years for assault. He was a member of the Rebels bike gang, having earlier been a promising amateur golfer. It was while he was in prison that renowned coach Ritchie Smith reached out and asked him whether he wanted to play competitive golf again. It was an offer he wisely accepted. His criminal record gave him visa issues entering New Zealand this week, and he only arrived on Tuesday evening.

He becomes the first lefthander to win New Zealand's National Open since Sir Bob Charles in 1973, and he earned a place in this year's Open Championship at Royal Portrush, as the event is part of the Open Qualifying Series.

Remarkably, he went bogey-free for his final 55



holes, having dropped his only two shots of the week on the eighth and 15th in the first round. He was paired in the final group with Koh.


He was paired in the final group with Koh, who was three shots clear by the eighth. However, Peake made birdies on nine and 12 to join Koh in a tie for the lead. LIV GOLF STARS GARCIA AND REED TO RETURN FOR MACAU

Major champions Sergio Garcia and Patrick Reed are the latest big names confirmed for the International Series Macau presented by Wynn - which will take place at Macau Golf and Country Club, from March 20-23.

Both competed in the inaugural edition of the event last year, when The International Series event made its debut.

Spaniard Garcia is captain of the Fireballs GC team on the LIV Golf League and will be joined by his teammates Mexican Abraham Ancer, the LIV Golf Hong Kong 2024 champion, Spaniard David Puig, who lost in a play-off to American John Catlin in the Macau event





last year, and another Spaniard Luis Masaveu, a close-season signing for the team. All four Fireballs GC players have shown good form already this season, securing the team title at the recent LIV Golf Adelaide by an emphatic six strokes last Sunday.

Garcia tied for 21st last year in Macau while Reed finished fourth and even played with Catlin in the third round when he shot his 59 - the first ever sub-60 on the Asian Tour. Later in the year Reed fired a 59 en-route to winning the Link Hong Kong Open - so it will be a popular return to the Greater Bay Area for the 2018 Masters champion.

Catlin and Puig have confirmed they will return to Macau as will Hong Kong native Taichi Kho, the 2023 World City Championship winner.

GARY WOODLAND NAMED RECIPIENT OF THE PGA TOUR COURAGE AWARD



The PGA TOUR announced that four-time PGA TOUR winner and 2019 U.S. Open champion Gary

Woodland has been named the recipient of the PGA TOUR Courage Award. After experiencing health struggles for much of the 2023 season, Woodland, 40, underwent surgery in September 2023 to remove a brain lesion and continues to manage symptoms as he competes full-time on the PGA TOUR.

The PGA TOUR Courage Award is presented to a person who, through courage and perseverance, has overcome extraordinary adversity, such as personal tragedy or debilitating injury or illness, to make a significant and meaningful contribution to the game of golf. Woodland is the seventh recipient of the PGA TOUR Courage Award, which was established in 2012, joining Erik Compton (2013), Jarrod Lyle (2015), Gene Sauers (2017), Morgan Hoffmann (2020), D.J. Gregory (2022) and Chris Kirk (2023).

Woodland was surprised with the PGA TOUR Courage Award during an exclusive interview with Michael Strahan that aired earlier this morning on ABC's "Good Morning America," and formally received the award during a presentation today at the Cognizant Classic in The Palm Beaches.

The Courage Award includes a contribution of \$25,000 from the TOUR to a charity of the award recipient's choice. Woodland has designated Champion Charities, an organization dedicated to research and patient

support in the following areas: brain tumor, brain disease and brain trauma. Woodland and his wife, Gabby, will match the donation, with a total of \$50,000 going to Champion Charities. Woodland returned to competition in January 2024 at the Sony Open in Hawaii. He recorded three top-25s in 26 starts during the 2024 PGA TOUR Season, highlighted by a T9 at the Shriners Children's Open, his first top-10 since his initial diagnosis. Woodland continues to manage physical, emotional and mental symptoms as he strives to return to top form. Currently No. 73 in the FedExCup, he is on his final season of eligibility from his 2019 U.S. Open victory and will need to win or finish top 100 in the final FedExCup Fall standings to secure full status for the 2026 PGA TOUR

BRIAN CAMPBELL CASHES IN ON BIG BREAK, WINS MEXICO OPEN FOR FIRST PGA TOUR TITLE



Brian Campbell cashed in on a huge break Sunday when his tee shot in a playoff bounced out of the trees and back into play, leading to a birdie on the second extra hole to win the Mexico Open at VidantaWorld over Aldrich Potgieter.

Campbell, who closed with a 1-under 70 at Vidanta Vallarta, won for the first time since he turned pro a decade ago and the timing could not have been better.

The victory sends him to the Masters, THE PLAYERS Championship and the PGA Championship, along with five of the \$20 million Signature Events left on the PGA TOUR schedule.

"To be in this position is just so unreal," the 31-year-old Campbell said after calmly holing a birdie putt just inside 4 feet on the 18th green for the win. "I can't believe it, really."

Campbell said it was grit that helped him win, and that goes back further than Sunday. He played his college golf at Illinois and was the low amateur in the 2015 U.S. Open at Chambers Bay. He earned a PGA TOUR card in 2017 and missed the cut 13 times in 20 starts. One of those was the Zurich Classic of New Orleans, where he received a penalty for slow play in a peculiar ruling because it also involved his partner, Miguel Angel Carballo.

And then it was back to the minor leagues for the next seven years until



he was runner-up three times and finished No. 8 on the Korn Ferry Tour to get another crack at the PGA TOUR.

The victory gives him a two-year exemption through 2027 and a busy March and April with the Arnold Palmer Invitational presented by Mastercard, THE PLAYERS Championship, the Masters and the RBC Heritage all on his schedule.

THOMAS DETRY CONQUERS MIND ON WAY TO FIRST PGA TOUR WIN AT WM PHOENIX OPEN



Thomas Detry knew his talent was enough to win on the PGA TOUR, and his peers knew it too.

"Freakishly talented," said Justin Thomas, who first met Detry at the 2010 Junior Ryder Cup.

Detry earned his first PGA TOUR title at the WM Phoenix Open, closing with four straight birdies at TPC Scottsdale for a 24-under total, seven strokes clear of Michael Kim and Daniel Berger. Detry began the final round with a five-stroke lead and extended it to six on the front nine; Berger pulled within three strokes midway through the final nine, but Detry answered the bell with four consecutive closing birdies at one of golf's most raucous events. With his first professional victory since the Challenge Tour's 2016 Bridgestone Challenge, Detry became the first Belgian to win on the PGA TOUR.

It was all made possible through internal improvements. Detry has a tendency for forward-thinking, creating mental pictures in his head of what could be, which runs counter to the TOUR-speak ideal of sticking to the process in every moment.

Detry's work paid off Sunday, notably on the par-5 13th hole, where he three-putted for par as his playing partner Berger made birdie to pull within three. A previous version of



Detry might have become flustered and let the adversity throw him off his routine. The WM

Phoenix Open, where fans might shout any number of things at any given moment, offers the ultimate test for a TOUR pro's mental game. Detry answered the bell.

Detry's golf story is far from finished, but in many ways, his first TOUR title is the culmination of a decade-plus stateside golf journey. He came from Belgium to attend the University of Illinois, and now he's Belgium's first PGA TOUR winner.


And California really was rising.

Patrick Rodgers (71, T3), also a Stanford alum with 11 wins there, seized the 54-hole lead.

Maverick McNealy (yep, also 11 wins, tied with Woods and Rodgers in the Stanford record books), was the clubhouse leader at 11-under after shooting a final-round 64 at Torrey Pines.

Åberg, who loves Torrey Pines and California, but whose bid to win here three weeks ago was derailed by illness, birdied holes 13-15 and two-putted the par-5 18th hole from 74 feet to shoot a final-round 66 and edge McNealy by one.

"I feel like this is my last day on the West Coast for quite some time, so I think In-N-Out



(Burger) would be appropriate," Åberg said of his likely celebratory meal.

Spoken like a true native. Indeed, there is something very California about the Åberg swagger and vibe. He plays fast, looks like he doesn't have a care in the world, and at Torrey

Pines was cool until the very end, rolling in a nearly 7-foot birdie putt for the winning margin on 18. "He doesn't get rattled by much," Skovron said. "He just keeps going. "That kind of poise is hard to explain, but at least we now know what to call it: California cool.

HOW TO DRIVETHE BALL LIKE MAJOR CHAMPION WYNDHAIT CLARK















INTRODUCTION

American Wyndham Clark is one of the best drivers of the golf ball where he ranked 18th for Strokes Gained: Off the Tee in the 2024 season. The three-time PGA TOUR winner has strong fundamentals in the way he sets himself up on the tee box, which was evident when he won the 2023 U.S. Open. Let's break down the key elements in his golf swing.

Photo 1

Wyndham has a balanced square set up where

his spine angle is symmetrical to the angle from his hips to knees, and with his arms hanging slightly outside the shoulders with a low hand position.

Photo 2

His low hands at address help promote a connected takeaway with the club head staying outside his hands.

Photo 3

You will notice here that the club head swings in line with the hands and is parallel to the body lines when the shaft is parallel to the ground.

Photo 4

Hands stay in front of his chest as the left arm starts rotating over the right to get the club head behind the hands. You'll notice he has a 'quiet' lower body with a lot of knee flex.

Photo 5

Left arm swings across the chest bisecting the plane of the shoulders while his right elbow stays down and close to the body. Square club













face illustrated by a flat left wrist and the club face parallel to his left forearm.

Photo 6

He is in a great position here with a full windup of upper body and minimal hip rotation. The knee flex increases throughout the backswing to increase downward pressure into the ground.

Photo 7

Here, his lower body squats down as arms and club lower to maintain an angle between the left arm and club shaft. Hands and shaft continue to bisect his right shoulder as the club swings down.

Photo 8

Club shaft is in a beautiful position on top of the right forearm, storing the arm/wrist angles to set up for a powerful release of angular momentum.

Photo 9

You'll notice that his feet/legs are using the ground to push up as the lower body is unwinding. Right forearm points at the ball with the right arm inside the left which creates a shallow inside out delivery path.

Photo 10

His hips are more open that upper body at impact with the right arm and shoulder down and behind the strike at impact. (Slight toe strike illustrated by the face defecting open after impact).

Photo 11

Club head continues accelerating on an arc back to the inside and realigns with hands on the forward swing. He maintains his spine angle as lower and upper body continue to rotate.

Photo 12

Wyndham keeps his head down and maintains his spine angle well after impact. Shaft bisects

In this tutorial, Anderson breaks down the golf swing of Charlie Woods, son of 82-time PGA TOUR winner Tiger Woods, and focuses on four key fundamentals.

shoulder plane illustrating a full release of the club and right side.

Photo 13

His arms are extended as hands and club rotate around the body to complete his swing.

Photo 14

Momentum of swing folds arms carrying hands behind his head into a full finish with right shoulder pointed towards the target.

Spend some time analysing these positions and it could well result in your drives being more consistent from off the tee like Wyndham Clark.





THE PLAYERS IS SIMPLY CRAFTED FOR A CHAMPION

Against a backdrop of weekly golf competitions which share labels of similar fare - they are Tournaments or Championships or Invitationals or Classics or Opens - only one stands out with distinction because of the first words in its title.

THE PLAYERS.

ll caps, all respect.

"It's our championship," said Jordan Spieth.

"To me, THE PLAYERS is THE PLAYERS. Everyone knows it is such a huge event; everybody knows it's a major," said Justin Thomas. "Every person in this field would be very, very content with holding the trophy at the end of the week."

Added Jason Day: "It has that feel and it's got a lot of history behind it." Were you to focus on "that feel" with THE PLAYERS, it would revolve around a trio of elements. One, it is played on the same stage each March, THE PLAYERS Stadium Course at TPC Sawgrass in Ponte Vedra Beach.

Two, it features the best field in golf. And three, the uniqueness of the Pete Dye-designed golf course - "It's a very simple formula here," said Tiger Woods. "Hit it good." - doesn't favour

big hitters over medium hitters, nor does it take the driver of your hand, though errant shots are seriously penalized.

As for the "history" behind THE PLAYERS, consider this nugget: After a string of players who adhered to the fairways-and-green mantra - Tim Clark, K.J. Choi, and Matt Kuchar in 2010-11-12, respectively – seven of the last 11 winners of THE PLAYERS Championships have at one time or another sat atop the Official World Golf Ranking.

We're talking Tiger Woods, Martin Kaymer, Day, Rory McIlroy, Justin Thomas, and Scottie





Scheffler (back-to-back the last two seasons), each of them in possession a set of golf skills that enabled them to not only stand clear of every other competitor at THE PLAYERS but also across 12 months.

Digest that for moment. It will help you understand why THE PLAYERS is promoted as being "Crafted for a Champion" and how it is the "Gold Standard" at the PGA TOUR level. Only

the elite of the elite qualify, so it's no wonder why the list of winners reads like a Who's Who of professional golf - Scheffler, Scheffler, Thomas, and McIlroy in four of the last five years; and a stretch from 1990 to 2004 where the winners included the likes of Davis Love III (twice), Woods, Steve Elkington (twice), Lee Janzen, Fred Couples, Justin Leonard, David Duval, Hal Sutton, and Nick Price.

And trust them, those who will be arriving for THE PLAYERS Championship this year (March 13-16) agree on what runs deep within their competitive spirit.

"I just think that it's special to us as being members of the PGA TOUR because it's our tournament. It's our premier event," said Scheffler. "This is the home of the PGA TOUR and so for us, I think it's a special place to come back year after year (where) we get to play this golf course and compete with the best players in the world and the best players on the TOUR."

The trophy which will be presented to the winner is a solid gold trophy of a golfer at the top of his swing on his follow-through. Should you think you see the likeness of a former PLAYERS Champion in the trophy, it's for good reason.

Tiffany & Co. used a process called "electroforming" which is both fascinating and a testament to the PGA TOUR's respect of a rollcall of winners. Through 2018, the year the trophy was created, there had been 38 winners of THE PLAYERS Championship so through computer modeling Tiffany designers incorporated aspects of each of those champions - from Jack Nicklaus (in 1973) to Webb Simpson (2018).

That the first "Gold Man" trophy went to McIlroy after his 16-under 272 total that held off Jim Furyk in 2019 is rather fitting because the Northern Irishman had said earlier in the week that his career would not be considered

complete without a win in THE PLAYERS.

That Thomas (2021) and Scheffler (2023-34) have also taken home a "Gold Man" statue since then is more proof that the best rise to the occasion when THE PLAYERS Stadium Course provides the stage.

Ah, yes, the stage. THE PLAYERS Stadium Course at TPC Sawgrass first hosted THE PLAYERS in 1983 and the love for this watery and beguiling Pete Dye design has resonated more passionately as the years have gone by.

"I've always loved this golf course," said Australia's Adam Scott, who won in 2004. "I think it's an amazing tournament venue."

Though it stretches to more than 7,300 yards, THE PLAYERS Stadium Course does not demand that you rip it forever off the tee or rely only upon your power game. Rather, one must plod his way along fairways that twist and turn and avoid diabolical bunkers that are placed strategically throughout.

Even the most esteemed ball-striker in history, Woods, struggled at first to understand the nuances of this golf course.

"The golf course is one that Pete has set up to intimidate you visually. You have to overcome that part of it," said Woods, who first played in THE PLAYERS in 1997 but didn't win until his fifth start, in 2001. "I think we all have to accept that you're going to hit good shots (but) get weird hops and some really, really funky lies." Woods, who did win a U.S. Amateur at this

course, has had stances in and around bunkers that have challenged his creativity but he said those who have mentally prepared themselves for such obstacles are the ones who have played nicely here.

And being mentally prepared emphatically means having the ability to compose one's



self when you step up to the tee at the islandgreen 17th. Arguably the most publicized par 3 in the world, No. 17 would be considered an easy shot for any elite professional, a 9-iron or wedge at approximately 137 yards.

"Sometimes when you're standing there in the practice round, you're like, 'How could people ever miss this green?' "said Scheffler. "Then you get up there and you start standing over your shot and you're like, 'Man, the wind's blowing off the right' and (suddenly you realize) it's a lot harder in competition than it is in practice."

So, yeah, the 17th can be daunting, a gut-check of a shot that you know has ruined many a dream at THE PLAYERS. But guess what? Scheffler, who could become the first to win THE PLAYERS three straight times, would rather be nowhere else in March. "It's always really special," he said. "You grew up watching this golf tournament and to be here playing it is always a special treat."

The No. 1 player in the world will have that opportunity again in March, but he'll have plenty of company as just about every top 100 player will also be in attendance. A gold standard, to be sure.

KRUYSWIJK TRIUMPHS AT MAGICAL KENYA OPEN



"It's special. I'm a little bit lost for words but this is for my family back home, my friends, my team and this

is for South Africa." said Jacques Kruyswijk after he claimed his maiden DP World Tour title after an impressive display of frontrunning to win the 2025 Magical Kenya Open presented by absa by two shots.

Kruyswijk did not put a foot wrong in the final round as he carded four birdies in a sublime 67 to finish two shots clear of Englishman John Parry and reach 18 under par, complete a bogey-free weekend and become the second South African winner of this event since it became part of the DP World Tour's Global Schedule.

The 32-year-old started the day with a onestroke lead but trailed halfway leader Parry after five holes of Sunday's fourth round, with the Englishman making back-to-back birdies at the fourth and fifth to hit the front.

But Kruyswijk soon hit back, rolling in lengthy birdie putts on the sixth and seventh to lead by one at the turn.

A fine bunker shot on the tenth helped Kruyswijk get up and down for a birdie to move two shots clear but Parry birdied the 12th to cut the gap once more and remain within striking distance.

However, Kruyswijk looked comfortable leading from the front as he continued to



give himself birdie chances and confidently knocking in par putts.

After Parry's wayward tee-shot on the 14th saw him drop further behind, Kruyswijk never looked like giving up his lead, holing from range for another birdie on the 16th to stretch his advantage to three before parring his way home to enter the winner's circle for the first time on the DP World Tour.

Parry finished in solo second on 16 under, continuing an impressive start to the season that has seen him record a victory and two second-place finishes in three visits to Africa so far this campaign.

Deon Germishuys was three shots further back in third, one ahead of fellow South African Jayden Schaper in fourth, while Italy's Gregorio de Leo and Englishman Jamie Rutherford, who came agonisingly close to a closing albatross, shared fifth place on 11 under.

Kruyswijk had to hang in there in the early stages of his round, producing a magnificent par save from ten feet on the third to keep hold of his one-shot lead.



The Chinese carded a three under par closing round of 69 at Doha Golf Club to sign for a 16 under par total, one shot ahead of last year's HotelPlanner Tour Number One Rasmus Neergaard-Petersen.

The 29-year-old started the day with a twostroke lead, which he doubled with birdies on the first two holes. He then cancelled out bogeys on the eighth and 11th holes with gains on the ninth and 12th, but Neergaard-Petersen had made his move and was six under par through 15 holes.

The Dane, who represented Continental Europe at the Team Cup last month, took the outright lead after his seventh gain of the day at the 16th as Li bogeyed the 15th hole. Momentum swung immediately back in Li's favour, however, as Neergaard-Petersen's par putt on the 17th stayed above ground and Li birdied the short par four 16th after driving the green to move ahead on 15 under par.

Neergaard-Petersen birdied the last to sit in the



clubhouse on 15 under after recording the lowest round of the day, a seven under par 65, but Li made up and down from a greenside bunker on the 18th, holing his birdie putt from 15 feet for a 16 under par total and his first victory since the 2022 BMW International Open.

Brandon Robinson Thompson recorded his best DP World Tour result as he finished third on 13 under par and 2021 Commercial Bank Qatar Masters champion Antoine Rozner carded a four under par final round of 68 to finish fourth.

ROSE, HOMA AND AN CONFIRMED FOR GENESIS SCOTTISH OPEN

on the calendar. It's always a fun experience and it would be cool to add another Genesis trophy to my collection."




ia Raad claimed the Africa Amateur Women's Invitational title at Leopard Creek today with a two-shot victory over her fellow South African Bobbi Brown.

Thanks to her win Raad earns starts in The Women's Amateur Championship, Final Qualifying for the AIG Women's Open, Joburg Ladies Open, The Investec South African Women's Open and the Waterfall City Tournament of Champions powered by Attacq.

Raad, who finished third in last year's inaugural Africa Amateur Women's Invitational, took a three-shot lead over last year's runner-up Brown going into the final round.

The 17-year-old made a nervy start and a double bogey seven on the par-5 2nd opened the door for her rival. The Golf RSA squad member settled down, however, and rallied with consecutive birdies on the 5th and 6th. She let a shot go at the 11th but holed a gutsy 12 footer at the 14th to stay two clear of Brown. A fine birdie at the 15th extended Raad's lead to three with three to play.

Brown had an eventful front nine cancelling out three birdies with four bogeys as she



tried to catch Raad. The 21-year-old dropped another shot at the 10th but bounced back in style with an eagle three after finding the green with her tee shot at the par-4 11th. A three-putt bogey at the 12th slowed her momentum but she followed it up with consecutive birdies as she battled to stay in touch with Raad.

At the par-3 16th, Raad almost holed a lengthy birdie putt but had to settle for a par, as did Brown. Both players parred the 17th and, although Brown produced a fine birdie at the last, Raad calmly rolled in her par putt for a two-shot victory and a four-under-par total of 212.

BRYAN NEWMAN WINS AFRICA AMATEUR ON HOME SOIL AT LEOPARD CREEK

ryan Newman of South Africa won the Africa Amateur Championship at Leopard Creek after cruising to a two-shot victory over Zimbabwe's Keegan Shutt. Newman said, "It feels really amazing. It's so special. To do it here at Leopard Creek makes it even more special."

Thanks to his victory in the second staging of the championship Newman earns an exemption into The 153rd Open at Royal Portrush as well as places in The Amateur Championship, the Alfred Dunhill Championship, The Investec South African Open and the Waterfall City Tournament of Champions powered by Attacq. The 17-year-old began the day with a five-shot lead over compatriot Roelof Craig and knew that someone from the chasing pack would

A dropped shot at the 3rd opened the door a little to Newman's rivals but a birdie three at the 6th helped steady the nerves before another shot was lost at the 9th.

have to make a serious run to challenge him.

Newman moved up a gear with a 20ft birdie putt at the 10th and another birdie at the 13th gave him a cushion which meant he could afford bogeys at the 16th and 17th. Newman



laid up his second shot at the 18th and played a safe approach over the water to the left side of the green leaving himself a comfortable two putts to claim the Africa Amateur trophy with an eight-under-par total of 280.

South African Charl Barnard carded a oneover-par 73 to finish in fourth position on one-under-par.

NURTURE FUTURE TALENT

he R&A and Asia-Pacific Golf Confederation (APGC) have launched the Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific (WAAP) Academy to support the development of world-class players in countries throughout the region.

The initiative, funded by Samsung and The R&A Foundation, builds upon the success of the Women's Amateur Asia-Pacific championship, which was introduced in 2018 to provide a pathway for the region's elite women amateurs to reach the international stage and earn life-changing opportunities to play in three major championships.

Golfers are invited to take part in a week-long programme under the guidance of leading instructors and experts who specialise in strength and conditioning, sports psychology, data analysis and bio-metrics, and short game and swing technique.

The first cohort attended the Siam Country Club in Thailand in December last year.

Dominic Wall, Regional Managing Director-Asia-Pacific at The R&A, said, "The growth of golf in countries around the world is core to our purpose and this includes supporting young golfers in their development by providing more opportunities to nurture their




skills both on and off the course.

INAUGURAL TGL SEASON HITS HIGH MARKS AS GOLF BROADENS ITS HORIZON

ith the inaugural TGL presented by SoFi season approaching its climax, the scorecard for the innovative and prime time team golf league backed by Tiger Woods and Rory McIlroy makes for some impressive reading.

Star power, entertainment value, great golf, eye-catching virtual holes - check.

Impressive TV ratings, smooth delivery of sophisticated tech, fun and buzz for in-person fans – check.

Strong buy-in from a wide range of investors, nimble management and full backing from PGA TOUR – check.

Six weeks on from its highly-anticipated launch, TGL has proven to be additive to golf's landscape and a massive success story.



The league has achieved so much in so little time that many believe will help advance the sport's growth, especially amongst new and younger audiences.

"It's just a different form of golf," said two-time major winner Justin Thomas, whose Atlanta Drive team has secured a spot in the Playoffs.


McIlroy, whose Boston Common team includes Japanese star Hideki Matsuyama, added: "I think people have enjoyed watching it on TV. There's nowhere I can go that people aren't talking to me about it."

For sports fans in Asia, TGL is broadcast live primarily on Tuesday and/or Wednesday mornings, which makes for easy viewing on TV or a device for those who skip work! The transformative league comprises of six teams (four players each) which are owned by some of the U.S.'s biggest sports franchise owners and A-list celebrities. They include Stephen Curry and Serena Williams plus Steve Cohen (owner of New York Mets), Arthur Blank (owner of Atlanta Falcons) and Fenway Sports Group (owners of Boston Red Sox and Liverpool).

With Mike McCarley, a long-time media executive, serving as CEO of TMRW Sports and with Woods and McIlroy co-founders of the venture, TGL is taking small but confident steps in showcasing a unique, engaging and exciting product that is so refreshing and different from the traditional 72-hole individual competitions which the PGA TOUR is the benchmark.

Each TGL match is played over 15 holes chosen from 30 original and frankly, mind-blowing creations by three companies including Nicklaus Design - with an emphasis on risk-reward and stunning visuals. The Spear, The Lava, On the Rocks and Boomerang are amongst the virtual holes created to test the players in the purpose-built, and tech-laden SoFi Center on the campus of Palm Beach State College in Palm Beach Gardens, Florida.

Golfers hit their tee shots and approach shots in the ScreenZone, off of real grass or sand, from 35 yards out into a giant, five-story simulator screen with state-of-the-art technology that is more than 24x larger than the standard golf simulator. Within approximately 50 yards, players move into the GreenZone, a specially-built short game area which has a 41 yard wide rotating putting surface with the technology under the green to change the undulation of the greens.



Each TGL match is played over 15 holes - chosen from 30 original and frankly, mind-blowing creations by three companies including Nicklaus Design - with an emphasis on risk-reward and stunning visuals.

McCarley, a former top executive at NBC Sports and Golf Channel, loves the team golf concept which brings out the characters of players and delivers high octane entertainment, and it's delivering on all fronts. The first nine holes are played in Triples format - each team member hits a shot in sequence - before going into the Singles format (1 vs 1) over the last six holes. The one fun twist is "The Hammer" which, when an orange towel is thrown by any team/player, can make a hole worth two points.

There's no messing about as players are on a Shot Clock to ensure they rip shots into the giant screen or hit a shot within the short game area inside of 40 seconds, and each match lasts approximately two hours. Inside SoFi Center there are 73 camera sources capturing the action including 20 robotic ones and 10 in

the virtual world. Included are six Full Swing monitors at both the front and back tee boxes, and six additional ones below a slope closer to the giant screen.

TV ratings have been above expectations - averaging 765,000 viewers across the six prime time matches on ESPN with three of the matches reaching a peak audience of 1.2 million viewers. Additionally, the TGL audience is one of the youngest in sports with 42% of its audience in the advertiser-coveted Adult 18-49 demographic.

There are no gimmicks in TGL, and the format makes the matches compelling, and golfers being golfers, they have taken the competition seriously and the mic-ed up feature for every players provides for interesting insights and thrash-talking.

Nearly every golfer in TGL as also commented on how much fun they are having playing TGL. Following Monday's match, Atlanta Drive GC's Patrick Cantlay commented, "It's fun being on a team with these guys. I think we get along great. There's good chemistry between us, and it's a fun environment out there." And Los Angeles Golf Club's Sahith Theegala said, "This is the most fun golf I've played in a really long time."

The regular season concludes on March 4, followed by the semifinal playoff series on March 17 and 18 and a best-of-three Finals series for the SoFi Cup on March 24 and 25. If you've not seen TGL yet, don't get left behind. It's fun.



Northern Ireland's Rory
McIlroy earned his 27th career
PGA TOUR victory with a

2025 season. The three-time
FedExCup champion shares
his thoughts from Pebble
Beach following his latest win.

here are a few venues in our game that I would call cathedrals of golf - Pebble Beach, Augusta National, St Andrews obviously, and maybe a few more that you could add in there. They mean a bit more than others which is probably to do with the history and the golfers who have won on those courses, and what those people have meant to the game of golf.

Starting the week, I had a big fat zero on all of those venues, and to finally knock one off at Pebble is very cool. I'm a big historian of the game and I remember all the championships that have been played here, and to add my name to that list is pretty cool.

It's been a great week for a lot of different reasons, hole-in-one during the first round, playing Cypress for the first time, and obviously getting a win. I couldn't have wished for a better start for my PGA TOUR season. I've been on a nice run of form since last fall and I've played some really good golf and continued that into this year. It's a great way to start my year.

Coming down the last hole at Pebble with a three-shot lead and being able to enjoy it somewhat was really nice. It was special to have the time to stand on the 18th tee box and just honestly look at one of the most beautiful holes in golf and enjoy it, enjoy the stroll up 18 and not feel like there was too much pressure.

Halfway up 18, I was rooting for Shane (Lowry) to make 4 so he would finish second on his own. It was nice to be able to have that and to also share this win with Harry (Diamond, his caddie). I'm the one who gets to lift the trophy, but there's a lot of people behind me and it's good to be able to share it with them.

Pebble Beach is a very different test than what you would typically expect at a U.S. Open. However, I do feel my game can travel to any sort of golf course in any conditions, in any setup. I feel like I'm a very well-rounded golfer and I can adapt to whatever I need to adapt to. I



was able to show that this weekend, especially during the third round with the wind and rainy conditions. I can win on different venues, different tests, firm courses, soft courses, windy, calm, rain, long golf courses, short golf courses. Anything that I feel is thrown my way, I feel like I'm prepared to handle it.

With more experience, I've become better with strategy and picking conservative targets at times, and maybe picking more conservative clubs off the tees too. Another big thing is obviously my short game. Last year, it was a little up and down where I would have a good week, then I'd have a bad week. There wasn't a ton of consistency in it. The up-and-down on the first hole during the final round for example, it's a big up-and-down just to get things going. I'm a big admirer of Scottie's Scheffler for a lot of different reasons, and every time I play with him and watch how he plays and how disciplined he is, it's a really cool thing to watch. And I'm trying to take a little bit of a leaf from out of his book. When one of your peers has the year like he had last year, and honestly the year like he had in '23 as well, you start to take notice at what he is doing and what has made him or helped him separate himself from the rest of the fields. There're impulses that I have on the golf course that it looks like Scottie doesn't have and I have to rein those in, and I have to try to be a little more disciplined about it.

For me, it's really about trying to get the best out of myself. I know if I can play to my capabilities and do what I did out there a little bit more, the world rankings or the career PGA TOUR wins will take care of themselves. Scottie is and has been the best player in our game for the last couple of years and I feel like I've been close. That's motivating to try to get the best out of myself and try to become the best player in the world again.

I want to do the right things every day, and that's being consistent, being disciplined, getting enough sleep, eating the right diet, doing the right amount of practice, recovering, making time for other interests in my life that can get me away from golf a little bit, too.

It's always been the mental side for me. That probably is the biggest barrier between me being good and being great. For the most part over the course of my career, I've had the physical attributes and hit the ball long and been able to do things that maybe some other guys aren't able to do, but it's sometimes been my mind or my thought processes that has held me back a little bit. I think I'm much better equipped now to handle whatever is thrown my way.



MY5KEY SWING SECRETS

The moves I focus on to maximise my power and accuracy will help you, too

Any swing that delivers the club in a neutral position through the impact area is a good one in my book. Over the past few seasons, I've put in a lot of hours on the practice range to iron out the areas that, in the past, made me have to fight hard to get the club square and on the right plane coming into the ball. When I was a kid, I used to have a bit of a loopy draw that could easily get out of control





if I wasn't careful. While I still slightly favour that right-to-left shape, I'm a much straighter hitter now and am also comfortable working the ball the other way. People often ask me if I lose distance when I grip down on the club for a little more control. My answer is that there's no real loss of yardage because the quality of strike is invariably better.

I. At address, think only of good posture and alignment

My back isn't as straight as a textbook swinger like, say, Adam Scott but I'm certainly not slouched at address either. I like to be athletic and comfortable, without being too rigid. Not everyone is built the same so you have to find the posture that works best for you.

I don't really think about anything at set-up — except alignment, an area I need to monitor constantly. If your feet, hips and shoulders are square at address, your swing path is likely to be square, too.

2. Get neutral with your takeaway

I work hard on moving the club away on a good plane and path, neither inside or outside the ideal line. That means quieter hands and more of a one-piece move for the first few feet. I turn my left shoulder under my chin to set the club in position, but also move my arms and hands away from my body to create width.

I like to see the shaft of the club parallel to the target line when horizontal to the ground, with the toe of the clubhead pointing straight up in the air. Fleetwood favours a draw but is comfortable shaping the ball both ways. 3. Keep it compact at the top

If I'm totally honest, I never really think about where the club is at the top of the backswing. I used to get across the line when I was younger and just starting out on Tour, but it's in a much better position now. That's down to my more balanced takeaway path. When I'm hitting an iron, I like my swing to be compact and just short of parallel at the top. With a fairway wood like this, the backswing will be a little longer.

4. Starting your downswing, hit against the wall

To achieve more stability and, in turn, deliver more power through the hitting area, I try to keep my left

PUTTING

BLOCK OUT DISTRACTIONS

HOW TO GET A MORE ACCURATE VIEW ON THOSE TRICKY-TO-READ PUTTS



At many traditional British parkland golf courses, you'll face a lot of putts that are difficult to read. The breaks are often very subtle and seemingly imperceptible to the human eye. How many times have you looked at a putt from several angles and still struggled to figure out which way it was going to move? The problem with reading putts is that your eyes take in a lot of supplementary

information that can affect your decision-making. A row of trees or a distant hedgerow, water features and even the shaping of the surrounds of the green can

trick your eyes into seeing slopes that don't exist. probably seen Tour pros crouching down to read putts with their hands cupped around their face and over the top of their visor (right). What they're doing is 'zoning' in on the putt, blocking out everything beyond the hole from their field of vision. That way, they have a much clearer view of the true slope and break. Try it for yourself and see how blocking out external distractions can

help you better visualise the break, too.

side firm with my left thigh staying solid. I like to feel like I'm hitting against a wall. This helps my bottom half stay square longer before turning towards the target. I splay my left foot slightly open to help my weight move onto my left side starting down.

People often advise a threequarter swing for control, but I'm not a big fan. I have to hit it hard and go all the way through.

5. Keep your right palm down

At impact, I want the club doing as little as possible and the hands even less. If I have a thought, it's keeping my right palm facing down through impact. That helps me squeeze the ball out properly. If the right hand gets underneath the handle, the ball is going right unless you compensate. A fairway wood needs a level impact that brushes the grass. But with irons you need to take a divot, a thing I always check.



DUSTIN JOHNSON

HOW I DIAL IN MY WEDGES

In 2015, my team and I sat down and evaluated my whole game. The glaring opportunity for improvement was my wedges. My Strokes Gained stat was 0.09 – very average for the PGA Tour. I didn't really practise my wedge play – and if I did, it was with little-to-no discipline. Yet my length off the tee meant I was often in the wedge zone. I grabbed the

opportunity. Within a year, my Strokes Gained stat had reached 0.35 and I was the US Open Champion. Wedges are all about distance control. If you can pitch pin-high but are 10ft out for line, you'll have a 10ft putt. With my coach, Claude Harmon, I created a system to improve my distance control. Let me explain.



HOW I COVER MY PITCHING YARDAGES

Three backswings, three wedges equals nine pitching distances

I like to keep things simple, so we decided on mastering the 'nine stock distances' system. Here, you create your nine distances by making three different swing lengths with three different wedges. I carry a 48°, 54° and 60° wedge (I also have a 64°, but I only use it for specialist shots). By honing three swing lengths with each club - half, three-quarter and full - I can create nine stock shot distances to call on when needed. Between them, they cover pretty much every shot between 60 and 150 yards. If I find myself in a gap, I make the shorter swing and just add a little speed through the ball. From here, it is really just a question of practice and repetition to train the feels and controlled acceleration that create consistency of speed at each swing length. There are so many different ways you can work on this. You can work on a certain swing length, on a certain distance, on a particular club or any combination of the three. The key is to stay disciplined, honing those swing lengths and all the time checking what you are doing against your nine yardage targets. 🗓





FIVE-MINUTE LESSON

PABLO LARRAZABAL

The 36-year-old Spaniard reveals three of the key secrets to his enviable short game.

<u>GW</u> How did you develop such a sharp short game?

PL: Competitive practice growing up. I got good at chipping fast when I was a kid because there were many good players at my club and we spent a lot of time at the chipping area. I lost lots of money! Being competitive in practice will make you better under pressure.

<u>GW</u> How do you visualise the shot you need to hit?

PL: Creativity is key. You have to create shots and see the ball rolling or pitching and stopping the way you want. It's all about seeing it. You can play the same shot with three or four different clubs, so you have to feel what you're most confident with.

<u>GW</u> How aggressive are you with your shot selection and expectations around the green?

PL: I think about the percentage for success with each of the clubs I could use and that tells me what to do – high or low, release or spinny, sand wedge or 9-iron. Go with the shot that gives the highest percentage. It can be better to leave a 12-foot putt than risk too much.

GW Some of that must be gut instinct?

PL: Chipping is all about sensation and what you feel in that moment. Sometimes you arrive at a tough shot and you go for it because you instantly feel it and you're confident. When you feel good, you have more percentage of doing it right. Trust your gut instinct.

STRATEGY

PLAY WITHIN YOURSELF ON A TOUGH OPENER

Take a double out of play on a demanding 1st hole

POINT 1 The first hole is always important, but especially so when it's a tough one like Wentworth's long par 4 here. You don't want to run up a big score so early, so it's a good idea to play within yourself. A four is always a good score but a five isn't a disaster, especially if you get a shot. Use a strategy to help you make a bogey at worst.

POINT 2 Hit the tee shot that leaves you the easiest second shot. This isn't always about hitting it as far as you can off the tee. This hole is a good example. Hit it too far and you can end up on a downslope – not good when you're hitting to a raised green. Hit the ball as far down the hole as you can while keeping it on a flat part of the fairway.

POINT 3 For most golfers, any hole over 400 yards means a long approach – at least a mid- to long iron. Aim for the centre of the green. If you miss, you're usually better off on the opposite side to the pin as it gives you more green to work with.

SWING STUDY: DANNY WILLETT

MAJOR POSTURAL CHANGES HAVE LEAD TO A MORE DYNAMIC GOLF SWING

It is generally not considered a smart move to overhaul your golf swing after winning a major championship but in Danny Willett's case, he had little choice. Writing on the European Tour's website in 2017, Willett admitted he'd been suffering with severe back issues. "I'd be taking painkillers in the morning after waking up in pain, getting an hour of physio before each round, playing the

round with a swing that hurt, then needing an hour of physio after the round. I was just knackered." In 2017, Willett took the decision to change coaches, switching from Pete Cowen, with whom he had worked for almost a decade, to Sean Foley. Two years on, Willett has validated his decision with victories at the 2018 DP World Championship and the BMW PGA Championship.



ADDRESS

The biggest set-up change Willett has made is creating more spine angle and adding more knee flex with the goal of setting his weight more towards the mid-part of his feet instead of forward towards his toes.

TAKEAWAY

In the past, Willett's arms hung almost vertically from his shoulders. Now they're a little more extended from the ball. As a result, he has a more stable base and is able to reduce the "up-and-down" nature of his swing.

AT THE TOP

Willett's 'old' swing was very upright with limited hip turn. The action placed a lot of pressure on his back during the swing. His shoulder and arm plane are now a little flatter – the result of the address tweaks.

DELIVERY

Willett has struggled with hip mobility issues since he was involved in a car accident many years ago. Having said that, he has been adding more pelvis and hip rotation into his downswing in order to shallow out his plane.

MASTER YOUR WEDGES

GET SPIETH-STYLE SPIN

HOW TO MASTER THAT DREAMY ONE-STOP-HOP-AND-GLIDE PITCH SHOT

"The one-stop-and-hop pitch is probably the most difficult to execute but it's one of my favourites, especially when I'm playing a links course. It will help you set up more birdie chances on par 5s and shorter par 4s. Whenever I'm faced with a half pitch to a tight pin and/or a super-fast green, this is my go-to shot because it's the easiest to control the distance. The problem is that it goes against convention and how you might expect to play it. But if you can fight your natural instincts, you'll breathe new life into your short game and approach those awkward, in-between shots with confidence."

STEP 1

"Using your highest loft wedge in the bag – mine is 60° – take a fairly narrow stance, play the ball in the centre, and stand square to the target with your weight forward and the clubface slightly open. This will automatically promote a descending angle of attack – the key to generating lots of backspin."

STEP 2

"Make a half swing by hingeing your wrists to the max and then unwind by feeling like you're cutting low and across the ball – almost as though you're mimicking a cut shot. To maximise spin, keep the clubhead low to the ground for as long as possible after impact."



GAINER CLINCHES FIRST LET VICTORY IN PLAYOFF AT SEASON OPENER

England's Cara Gainer secured her first Ladies European Tour (LET) victory after defeating India's Diksha Dagar in a playoff at Lalla Meryem Cup in Morocco.

Going into the final day, only a two-shot difference separated the top 10, making it a tight leaderboard with lots of players in contention to win the season opener.

Since turning pro in 2020, Gainer started the day in T5 and produced a solid final round of 69 (-4) at Royal Golf Dar Es Salam. This marked her third visit to the tournament having previously come T30 in 2024 and T49 in 2023. The maiden LET winner will take the full 500 points to sit top of the Order of Merit. The 29-year-old rolled in birdies on holes

The 29-year-old rolled in birdies on holes two, four, and eight, before another three off the bounce on the back nine. She dropped her only two shots of the day on the front nine.

"First tournament back of the year, you can't really ask for any better," said Gainer. "I was aware when we started how many people were in with a shout, but I knew there's a lot of good players. I knew people were going to be shooting low scores, so I just wanted to keep in my own bubble, and I thought if I had shot, maybe three or four under, there could be a chance. Then, when I started to birdie the last few, I thought hold on a minute, this could really be real."

Talking about her final round, the 29-year-old said: "I missed short putts on 11, 12, 13, and 14 which were all makeable putts, so was getting frustrated. Then we got to the par-five,



where my caddy [Seb Brock] and I said we could still win this if we birdie. Then from there I just kept racking them up, hitting really great iron shots, with straight up the hill putts so that was great."

Gainer had her fiancé Seb Brock on the bag this week. She continued: "He's come with me to caddy this week. It's really special to have him here and celebrate my first win with me."

During the offseason, she analysed last season. Gainer had a bit of wrist injury during 2024 so was a tricky year but focused on what she needed to do to hit the perfect shot during the break.

Diksha Dagar came just short in the playoff to claim second place at the season opener. This still makes a very good start to Dagar's 2025 campaign, which saw her also set the clubhouse record on -9 with a stunning final round of 67 (-6).

Having started the day in T14, she made seven birdies across the last 18 holes, and dropped her only shot of the day on hole 14.

Sweden's Kajsa Arwefjall finished the highest rookie and marks a solid start to her first LET season. The Swede clinched LETAS Order of Merit winner and Rookie of the Year last year so will be one to watch.

THITIKUL CRUISES TO 2025 PIF SAUDI LADIES INTERNATIONAL CROWN

Jeeno Thitikul secured her fifth Ladies European Tour (LET) title after storming to a four-stroke victory at the 2025 PIF Saudi Ladies International.

The Thai star, who is number four in the Rolex Women's World Golf Rankings, began the day with a three-shot lead at Riyadh Golf Club.

Thitikul rolled in a birdie on the first before adding further birdies on the fourth and seventh holes to put herself in a commanding position.

Another birdie on the 10th was followed by a bogey on the next hole however, she soon added another birdie on 12 before a dropped shot on the 14th hole.

A round of 69 (-3) on the final day to end the week with a score of 16-under-par was more than enough to ensure Thitikul began her 2025 season in the best way.

"It means a lot to win and it's a really nice



start for my 2025 season," said Thitikul, who won the 2021 LET Race to Costa del Sol and Rookie of the Year titles. "I think everyone will be proud especially my team out there,

they know how hard we work so it's paid off. It doesn't look easy at all, especially to me! The greens are quite hard here and I am just trying to be more present and play my best out here. It feels like Scotland today. It was a challenging week here; it was tough on the tournament days with the weather. I am just trying to be myself out there on the course, I don't want to take things too seriously. That's why I can play smoother and be myself out there. We play week in, week out alongside the best players in the world. At the same, we're trying to do our best and that's what sport is. Turning 22 next week and having this win as an early birthday present, is really special."

Korea's Somi Lee finished the week in second place in the Individual competition with a score of 12-under-par after she captained her Team to victory. England's Annabell Fuller recorded her best-ever finish on the LET with solo third place on 11-under-par.

VANI USES EXPERIENCE TO CARVE OUT A WIN IN 4TH LEG OF HERO WPGT

Vani Kapoor used all her experience to land a crucial birdie on the back nine to win the fourth Leg of the Hero Women's Pro Golf Tour at the Bombay Presidency Golf Club Ltd. It was Vani's first win in 2025 and the first since the success at the DLF Golf and Country Club in the 12th leg of the 2024 season. Vani, 31, bogeyed the 11th and the 13th and at that stage trailed two amateurs, Saanvi Somu, the overnight leader, and Anuradha Chaudhuri. The three were playing together in the final group.

Then came the turnaround as Vani birdied the Par-4 15th. On the same hole Anuradha dropped a bogey for a two-shot swing. From being one ahead Anuradha fell one back.

Saanvi, who with five holes left was even par for the tournament and in the lead, also bogeyed the 15th to fall to 1-over. She was then tied with Vani.

Saanvi, who has finished runner-up four times in the past, parred the 16th but dropped shots on the 17th and the 18th, which were parred by Vani and Anuradha.

The pars helped Vani stay ahead of the field at 1-under 69 for the day and 1-over 211 total. Anuradha was stranded at 2-over and was sole second. Saanvi meanwhile fell to 3-over and



finished in a tie for third alongside Sneha Singh (66) and Ridhima Dilawari (67), who had earlier taken the clubhouse lead at 3-over.

Vani opened the day with two birdies on the first two holes, but then endured eight pars after that. She bogeyed the 11th and the 13th to fall back but produced a winning birdie on the 15th.

Anuradha played consistent with one birdie and one bogey, but the latter proved costly, while Sneha and Ridhima produced the two best cards of the day. Sneha was bogey free with 66 and Ridhima shot 67 with four birdies against one

bogey.

Saanvi had three birdies and five bogeys, three of which came in the last four holes and cost her a maiden win the on the pro tour, while still being an amateur.

Lavanya Jadon (71), Shweta Mansingh (70), amateur Mannat Brar (72) and Jasmine Shekar (75) occupied the sixth to the ninth place while three players including the 2024 Hero Order of Merit winner, Hitaashee Bakshi (75), amateur Keerthana Rajeev (73) and Khushi Khanijau (71) tied for the tenth place.

Among other prominent players Gaurika Bishnoi (77) was T-13, Seher Atwal (80) was T-16, Amandeep Drall (75) was T-18th and Neha Tripathi (77) was T-21.

Sneha Singh, who was tied fifth in the first leg and won the next two, finished tied-third this week. She continues to lead the Hero Order of Merit with winnings of Rs.5,76,900 while Vani Kapoor moved into second place with Rs.4,54,000 and Jasmine Shekar with Rs.3,26,500 was third.

It was a great week for amateurs, who had four finishers in the Top-10. Two of those amateurs, Saanvi and Mannat are headed to the Women's Amateur Asia Pacific Championships in Vietnam next week.

LETAS ANNOUNCES THE ISLANTILLA OPEN WITH RECORD PRIZE FUND

The LET Access Series (LETAS) has today announced a new event on the 2025 calendar, the Islantilla Open, which will take place this July. OLYMPIC CHAMPION LYDIA KO WINS 2025 HSBC WOMEN'S WORLD **CHAMPIONSHIP**

Lydia Ko finally conquered the LPGA's HSBC Women's World Championship, clinching her first title at her 11th attempt with a dominant four-stroke win over Ayaka Furue and Jeeno Thitikul in Sunday's final round.

The 2024 Olympic gold medalist and Women's British Open champion overcame a middling start before finding her rhythm with a birdie on the par-5 sixth.

Ko added back-to-back birdies on Nos. 7 and 8, seizing control of the leaderboard from then on.

Despite dropping two bogeys after the turn,



the world No. 3 closed with a solid 69, sealing a 13-under-par 275 total at Sentosa Golf Club.

"I dreamt last night that I won but then I woke up, and I was like, dang, it's not real yet," said Ko, who secured her 23rd LPGA second place in 2015.

"It's exciting to finally add Asia's major to my major collection," the New Zealander

World No. 2 Jeeno Thitikul fought hard to chase Ko down, but her charge fell just carded a closing 68. The Thai star made an early push with two birdies in the first four holes to trail Ko by a stroke at 9-under but couldn't maintain the pressure.

leadership, unwavering integrity, and indomitable spirit, those who knew him well also saw another side of him-a golfer who found peace, joy, and camaraderie on the


greens.

Golf has historically been seen as an elite sport, often difficult to access for the general public. And Golfing events have also been equally restrictive, but with the advent of the Qutab Golf League (QGL), that barrier has come down considerably through its unique inclusive format.









he partnership between Game of Life Sports (GOLS), led by Amit Kharabanda and Samant Sikka, and Digraj Golf Inc. (DGI) has brought a fresh, exciting energy to the Qutab Golf League and indeed to the sport of golf itself. With Rs 20 lacs in prize money being offered, with the first-place team securing Rs 12 lacs-an impressive incentive that will undoubtedly fuel fierce competition, and we are already seeing that happen. Where else but at the Qutab Golf League, can a golfer who has no access to a membership in any golf course, compete, on one of Delhi's best golfing facilities, with equal playing rights, same as a member would enjoy?

In its inaugural season, the Qutab Golf League features 10 teams with each team comprising of 16 members. The uniqueness and fairness of the League reflects in the format it is played on - an Individual Stableford Format, with each player playing to 75% of their original handicap. elhi's Shubham Narain put behind his disappointments of the past few seasons by registering victory on the third playoff hole against Panchkula-based amateur Apant Singh Ahlawat

Panchkula-based amateur Anant Singh Ahlawat at the Final Qualifying Stage of the TATA Steel PGTI Qualifying School 2025 played at the Golmuri Golf Course in Jamshedpur.

Twenty-seven-year-old Shubham emerged Q School champion with a par on the 13th hole (third playoff hole). Shubham's opponent Anant missed out on a par on the third extra hole.

Shubham Narain (71-64-67-66) and Anant Singh Ahlawat (67-64-67-70), both sons of Army officers, went into a playoff after they were tied at the top at totals of 16-under 268 at the end of the regulation 72 holes. Both players then made pars on the first two playoff holes. As further play was not possible due to the fading light, the resumption of play was scheduled for the next day at 7 am (February 8).

Shubham, who turned pro in 2017 while he

was still a teenager, came out on the morning of February 8 and made a two-on and two-putt for par on the par-4 13th hole which was used as the third playoff hole. He tapped-in for his winning par putt from one and a half foot. The 28-year-old Anant, a former All India Amateur champion, on the other hand, missed his par putt from eight feet that brought his challenge to an end.

Shubham, who bagged the winner's cheque worth INR 75,000, said, "First sealing my full card and now winning a tournament after eight years and that too my first one as a professional is very special. I also ended up with my lowest four-day total at an event. This may be just the Q School but a win is a win and that gives me a lot of self-belief going ahead.

"I was delighted with the way I held my game and my thoughts together despite the added pressure of coming out and playing an extra day. The learnings from the past few seasons have helped me change my approach towards the game. Earlier, I feel I was too hard on myself. But I'm more patient now, I don't keep

my expectations too high and give myself more room for error. Hopefully, I can carry forward this form into the season."

The cut in the final round had gone at threeunder 281 which meant that the top 33 players earned their full cards for the 2025 PGTI season. The top 33 included five amateurs and six foreigners (three from Bangladesh and one each from the USA, South Korea and Italy).

Yuvraj seemed to be cruising to victory after he made birdie on the 11th. But Sandhu had some late jitters when he found the hazard on the 15th and dropped a bogey even as Jamal collected a couple of birdies to narrow the lead to one shot.

However, Yuvraj roared back with a timely 12-feet birdie conversion on the 16th to extend his lead to two shots.

Sandhu's bogey on the final hole couldn't stop him from marching to his seventh PGTI title and overall 10th professional win. Yuvraj took home the winning purse worth INR 15 lakh.

Yuvraj, who fell just one stroke short of matching his record for the lowest winning total at Tollygunge, said, "All the work I did with my mental coach recently seemed to have paid off as I was in control of the situation and stayed calm through the week.

"Jamal really challenged me over the last 36 holes but I think it's just the comfort level that I have at Tolly that helped me stay ahead and bring out my best. I really like the warmth at this club and the food here. Last time I won here at Tolly, my career had a jump-start. Now, I'm hoping this win can once again give me a lift."

Chandigarh's Yuvraj Sandhu made it back-to-back titles as he registered impressive five-shot win after dominating the final round with a

Sandhu kept up the intensity on the back-nine by scoring two more birdies to romp home to victory with ease thus lifting his 11th title and recording his eighth win on the PGTI.

Yuvraj also became the first player in over two

years to win back-to-back titles on the PGTI. Manu Gandas was the last player to achieve the feat in December 2022.

Sandhu, who bagged the winner's purse of INR 15 lakh to further consolidate his lead in the TATA Steel PGTI Ranking, said, "I was just thinking about my checklist of achieving backto-back wins at the start of the day. I was a bit nervous and anxious but wanted to stamp my authority today.

"The key for me in the first two weeks of the season has been staying calmer. I've been working on that aspect for some time now and I've been able to achieve those goals."

Saptak Talwar's final round of 67 helped him climb two spots and post his second runner-up finish on the PGTI.








ATTACHARYA STAMPS AUTHORITY WITH FINAL DAY 63 FOR RESOUNDING FIVE-SHOT WIN


